

Although mostly in tins and packages it was always very much appreciated and sadly needed this need is even more acute now with the continued pressures of a cost-of-living crisis. Stroud District Council is once again inviting residents and businesses to share their views in its **Annual Satisfaction Survey**, which helps shape how local services are delivered. Between Monday 1 September and Tuesday 14 October, a random selection of 500 residents and 200 businesses will be contacted by independent research company Phoenix MRC, which is conducting the survey on behalf of the council.

In association with Gloucestershire County Council **discounted compost bins** are available. Gloucestershire residents are able to get £15 off eligible bins on the website. Discount will automatically be applied. One per household. Full terms and conditions available at www.getcomposting.com

Community Connexions (CC)

is a transport charity providing a service to the elderly, infirm, socially & rurally challenged of the county of Gloucestershire.  - · Communities and Wellbeing
 - Local Economy
 - Housing

• Be time-bound with a clear delivery date and contingency plans.

Eligible projects that show strong community support could receive a council pledge, typically averaging around 30% of the total project cost.

If a group isn't ready to launch this autumn, they can prepare for Round Four, opening in January 2026, with workshops planned for mid-February.

Church Letter

What a Wonderful World!

I've recently had some raised beds built in my garden and I can't tell you how much pleasure it gives me to see the herbs and vegetables growing. By the time you read this, the Uley Village Show will have been and gone for another year, and you'll know whether they're prize-winning cucumbers or not!

My morning routine now includes picking caterpillars off the kale - which I've discovered to be a rather mindful activity, as well as limiting the number of leaves reduced to doilies.

There are so many ways that we can care for creation, and like many activities that take us beyond ourselves and our preoccupations, it turns out that doing this is good for our mental health and well-being.

The first of the Second Sunday Specials* at St Giles was a new beginning for all of us as we began the service with hot chocolates and croissant and enjoyed being led by some of the young people who are starting out at secondary school. They kept us on our toes, taught us a song and read these words of Jesus:

Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they? Can any one of you by worrying add a single hour to your life?

The experience of worship, at its best, is one that helps us to find our place in relation to God, one another, ourselves and creation. It is an act of defiance, a silencing of the voices that tell us if we simply try harder we can somehow work everything out for ourselves. It is an invitation to entrust ourselves to God who made us and knows us and loves us, God who knows what it is to be human, to suffer and to die, God who makes all things new. It is an invitation to dare to believe that we are worthy of love.

The next service is on 12th October 10.00am at St Giles - What a Wonderful World! – where we will be giving thanks for the beauty of this place and the many ways people care for creation in this village. We will also take time to lament the consequences of humanity's lack of care for creation. Perhaps as we reflect and talk together, we will resolve to take some small action to show our care. Please bring along something you've grown, if you

can. There will be an activity in the churchyard, and possibly a walk on offer for those who want to stretch their legs. This will be a simple and child-friendly service of Holy Communion, in which everyone can be blessed, wherever you are on your journey of faith.

*Second Sunday Specials are short church services for absolutely anyone, to get together to celebrate different aspects of village life. Garden Notes

After the warmest, driest summer since 1976, it seems bizarre to think of the winter months ahead. The unpredictability of our weather is the biggest challenge to gardeners and farmers alike. The drought persisted week after week leaving normally lush green fields as dry as prairies and our local cows being fed their winter silage in summer. Organic herds like Jess's Ladies, bereft of their organic pastures, are driven to crowd funding the winter feed for their herd or risk losing them. It has been heartening to see the response, I hope they make their target. Try their kefir - its amazing.

Let's hope that the rain falls and reservoirs and aquifers are replenished... preferably at night!

Preparing for Winter

There are always jobs to do, but in our garden 'putting the garden to bed' is not one of them. As we understand how damaging to wildlife and soil our 'tidying' can be, its time to take a gentler approach. I do remove fallen or soggy material to the compost, but leave standing virtually everything

else till late January or early February. Many insects and larvae overwinter on stems around the garden and with milder winters, growth continues so on warm days solitary bees are abroad and looking for sustenance. Late autumn flowers are a precious resource.

Autumn gales bring a real risk of damage to roses and young trees. Wind rock can cause roots to snap and water ingress to rot the rootball. Stake trees BEFORE leaf fall and remove excess top growth from roses.

The soil is still warm, so its the perfect time to assess and renew your garden by moving plants, or replacing with something fresh. No need to tolerate an unloved shrub - recycle to an appreciative friend and go treat yourself. There are bargains to be had at the back of garden centres as they make way for the excesses of all things Christmas. A little TLC and these tired, discarded specimens can be brought back to life.

Clear space in the garage or greenhouse ahead of time to move vulnerable pots before winter frosts descend. Its a great time to take cuttings as a back up plan too. If you have pots of basil, parsley or mint outside, why not take easy cuttings of them to keep in the house and extend the bounty of fragrant fresh leaves for cooking.

This year in the kitchen garden, I've finally got around to sowing green manure, improving soil fertility, structure and protecting against nutrient erosion in winter rains. Ideally they should be chopped and dropped, if you're no dig, (or cut down and turned into the soil) before flowering though they'd be much appreciated by those pollinators still out and about.

On the last day of October the harvest season comes to a close and winter begins.. plus every child in the village knows its Halloween! Carve a pumpkin, make a corn dolly - Prema Arts - there's a nice autumn course?!






