Robin Bus Service

At the January 2025 Cllr Wendy Thomas reported back about progress with the Robin Bus Service (your bookable bus service) funded by GCC (see https://www.gloucestershire.gov.uk/transport/the-robin/). Uley residents can alight a bus from outside the Community Shop. The idea is that you can book in advance (by phone or, once you have registered, on-line) a ride to any one of the many stops in the Berkeley Vale. UPC would like to hear from residents about their experience of using Robin Bus Service.

Flooding

Don't let it rain (for a while, at least). UPC are encouraging GCC and SDC to take a joined-up approach to flooding in the Uley Valley. Recent Highways Department resurfacing on Lampern Hill was undone by flooding. Cllr. Juliet Browne (Flood Warden) is urging GCC to adopt a long-term approach to flood prevention before undertaking highway repairs.

The Council again want to publicly thank Robin, Sally and Bobby Coates for their extraordinary efforts to keep highways clear during recent heavy rainstorms. Robin reported that he had to change out of wet clothes five times in one day. If you see them or anyone else working around flooded areas, please either find another route or pass with extreme care so that you do not create a wave which hamper their work or could endanger them.

You may have seen reports of the Government's plans for the devolution of power in England. This could have significant implications for who does what in Gloucestershire. Church Letter

Welcome to February!



In the Birmingham Museum Art gallery we can discover this painting by Benjamin Williams with the title "February Fill Dyke". It depicts a rural scene in the midst of a wet and dismal day. Its title comes from a saying "February fill dyke, be it black or be it white", referring to the way the dykes traditionally fill with either water or snow in this month Although the painting was hardly noticed when it was initially displayed, it has since then become very popular and a much-loved painting. The dank and water covered fields in the foreground give way to a cheerful cottage, obviously inhabited because smoke is rising from the chimney and behind that the Parish Church with its solid tower. All this is flanked by a sky touched with gold, suggesting the sunset perhaps.

I wonder why the picture speaks to so many people. It is after all an ordinary rural scene; nothing special, you may say? Perhaps it is because of its very ordinariness that people can relate to it. It encourages them to ponder on what gives people hope and security in the midst of their lives at times.

We think about those three subjects. At its best a home is a symbol of relationship, of warmth and succour from the storms of daily living, a place to rest. The Guardian newspaper has been running a series of articles where people have described what home is for them. For most it wasn't so much the house they lived in, but the place where they felt they could be true to themselves. I wonder what that word "home" means to you? Where do you find relationship, and where you can be true to yourself?

The church, at its best is a symbol of continuity – I suggest that this building has been there for centuries. It is also a continuing and silent reminder that there is more to life than the day to day. A place and a people offering strength in times of joy in birth and marriage, as well as in times of sadness, in death. A place in which the deep truths of the Christian faith of birth and death, forgiveness and resurrection have been celebrated for hundreds of years.

Philip Larkin wrote a poem called "Church going" in which he goes into a church in a cynical frame of mind, but as he looks around he stops and thinks. The last verse reads: "A serious house on serious earth it is. In whose blent air all our compulsions meet, Are recognised, and robed as destinies. And that much can never be obsolete. Since someone will forever be surprising A hunger in himself to be more serious, and gravitate with it to this ground....." I wonder what your local parish church means to you? How would the nature of the town or village be changed if it just wasn't there anymore?

And thirdly the sunset. A symbol of our dependence on the regularity of day and night. At this time of the year, as the days begin to draw out, and daylight becomes stronger we can look forward to warmer days. I wonder how often I take it granted that when the sun sets in the west, that it will rise in the east giving us hope. In the memorable words of Scarlet Ohara "Tomorrow is another day!"

From the dismalness of the foreground we move to the hope of home, to hope in God's loving purposes and to the source light and heat. I need to notice these and give thanks – even on a dark February day!

Garden Notes for February

Thoughts about Biochar

As a gardener, I'm always looking to improve the soil and am bordering on evangelical on the benefits of homemade compost. However, this is a constant activity that our own three-bay system cannot fully support. Enter Biochar!

Biochar is an organic material carbonised slowly at high temperature with almost no oxygen (pyrolysis). The farming system (Terra Preta meaning Black Soil) was developed in the Amazon by indigenous people over a 1000 years ago to sustain their population on poor, acidic soil.

Biochar's main function is supporting aerobic, healthy soil ecosystems which lead to improved plant health and vitality indirectly. Positive evidence is building for its use in agriculture and climate change worldwide though scientific research is ongoing.

Pros

- · One application only
- · Sequesters carbon
- Due to its highly porous nature, it is water and nutrient retentive, good for drainage and soil aeration which in turn saves on fertiliser, irrigation and reduces CO2. Helpful for heavy clay soils.
- It is a fixed carbon, therefore not releasing greenhouse gasses as conventional compost alternatives do
- Highly stable, so one application remains effective for hundreds/ thousands of years
- · Improves plant health and crop yields

 Adding Biochar to compost heaps after turning can help reduce methane and nitrous oxide emissions

Cons

- Its expensive, however so is buying in mulch and compost
- Depending on the source of Biochar, it can add alkalinity raising the soil PH where acid loving plants are being grown. Check PH of your own soil and that of your supplier of Biochar.
- Can raise already high PH alkalinity to unhelpful levels - see above
- If not 'charged/enriched' it can lock up nutrients in the short term (as would an application fresh wood chips) depriving plants from nitrogen uptake.
- Biochar production needs to be organic agricultural or forestry waste rather than monoculture products
- Scaling up for global use could lead to misguided production methods

How to apply Biochar in your garden

Know your source - are they FSC (Forest Stewardship Council) certified? Check with your supplier if it is already charged/enriched/inoculated. Read their application notes.

There are a number of ways to charge your biochar but here's what I'm doing: Put biochar into a container or wheelbarrow. Add plenty of water (its very absorbent). Mix in the nutrients of your choice/availability - homemade compost, manure, liquid seaweed, worm cast liquid, comfrey and nettles. Leave for AT LEAST 3


DAYS or longer if possible. This allows the biochar to fully take up the mix and offset any chance of nutrient depletion. Apply after worst of winter rains Then thats it never again!

OR mix into your compost heap as you turn it in February to allow a month or so before applying in the garden.

Agriculture

Given worldwide depleted soil health, Biochar has the potential to make a move. from chemical fertilisers and pesticides. to fostering soils rich in microbes - a shift from an antibiotic to a probiotic approach. I think a pig just flew by...

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

Citizens Advice



We're planning a summer getaway to Greece and I'm worried we'll forget something important, which could ruin the holiday. What steps can we take to make sure we're fully protected and prepared if anything goes wrong?

Booking a holiday can be overwhelming, especially if it's been a while since you last went away. It's unlikely anything will go wrong, but we've prepared a simple checklist to make sure you can relax into your holiday knowing you're protected from the unexpected.

Check your passport is in date - especially for EU travel

Renewing your passport can take several weeks and isn't something to leave until the last minute. Check the validity of your passport for your trip on GOV.UK by finding out the entry requirements of the country you're travelling to.

If you're heading to Europe, bear in mind EU countries don't accept passports more than ten years old. This includes passports issued pre-Brexit, which may have longer expiry dates. Just remember, the golden rule for EU travel is: if your passport was issued over ten years ago, you'll need to get it renewed.

Know your rights if something goes wrong

If your flight's delayed long enough - usually two to four hours, depending on the journey - your airline must provide access to food and drink vouchers, phone calls and emails, and accommodation if you're delayed overnight. If it's cancelled, you're legally entitled to a full refund or replacement flight to help you get to your destination. You're also entitled to compensation if your airline delays, loses or damages your checked-in luggage.

Get travel insurance

Although it's an extra expense, travel insurance can cover many of the things already mentioned, like flight delays and lost luggage, but also things like a holiday cancellation and medical emergencies.

Citizens Advice recommends getting insurance as soon as you book a holiday to make sure you're covered right away but always check first to see if an existing insurance policy, or your bank account, covers what you need for your holiday. There's no need to double up if you're already covered!

The chances are your holiday will be problem-free, but early planning and preparation can make all the difference. If you need advice on a consumer problem, head to the Citizens Advice website www.citizensadvice.org.uk

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


