Church Letter

It's wonderful to be celebrating the love and joy of wedding season as the sun continues to shine!

One bride has arrived on a tractor, flowers and joyous singing have filled the churches, and rose petal confetti catching the wind makes for wonderful photographs.

Most of the weddings I've taken so far this year have been for people with a family connection to the parish. If you live in the parish, then you too have that connection with St Giles in Uley, St Barts in Nympsfield and Holy Cross in Owlpen and so can be married, baptised, have your child christened or have a funeral in the church – these churches belong to the whole parish and are here for you whatever is going on in your life.

At its best Christian worship shapes lives in a particular way, helping each of us to flourish and live life to the full. Week by week, year by year, we tell and re-tell the story of God's love for God's people and we look to Jesus to show us what God is like. Each of us will have our own way of believing, or not as the case may be, and anyone with a faith that is living will have questions and be seeking to work out what difference having faith makes to our day-to-day ordinary lives with its

up and downs, joys and sorrows. We are all on a journey.

Wherever you are on the journey, whatever stage of life you may be at, you are welcome - these churches are here for you: for tears of joy and pain, for prayer, for curious wondering, for tentative, wholehearted or, in the case of those who have come to church via the pub, 'rugby-terrace' singing.

I honestly believe that worship is good for us, even when it's not to our personal taste, or when we don't like the people we are gathering with, because all of this can help to take us bevond ourselves. And it is in this 'beyond ourselves' place that we have a hope of encountering the God who is both beyond and within us. In worship we are reminded of the truth that we are not the centre of our little world and that the realities that we grapple with personally, societally and globally do not have the final say. We come to know ourselves, extraordinary though this is, as utterly loved by God and called to grow in this love, to become more and more who we are made to be.

The worship we offer as we gather Sunday by Sunday is like a little rehearsal for life. We learn to look up, we learn to say sorry, we learn that we are forgiven and have the chance to start again, we learn that there are ancient ways that are true, we learn that there are things too great for us to fully understand, we learn that we can dare to name the realities of our lives in all their wonder and awfulness, we learn that we are not alone, we learn that God has done everything that is needed to bring us close again, we learn that there is enough for everyone, we learn that we can be sustained for the journey, whatever that might mean, we learn that we can return, again and again and again.

As we pray at the beginning of the wedding service, so I pray for this whole community today:

God of wonder and joy: grace comes from you, and you alone are the source of life and love

Without you, we cannot please you; without your love, our deeds are worth nothing.

Send your Holy Spirit,
and pour into our hearts that most
excellent gift of love,
that we may worship you now
with thankful hearts
and serve you always with willing
minds;

through Jesus Christ our Lord Amen.

Garden Notes for June

Scent in the garden...all year long!

We've all had that incredible experience of being taken back to a distant time or place by scent, so powerfully evocative. Equal is the disappointment when you bend to smell a beautiful rose if it has an absence of olfactory joy.

After attending a recent lecture by Nick Bailey (best known from Gardeners World) on 'year long scent in the garden', I thought I could impart some of the best gems of his extensive knowledge.

Nick's Fab Four for 365 days of scent

- January March: Sarcococca (sweet box) evergreen shrub. Just a couple of stems brought into the house in winter will scent a room.
- April May: Narcissus Poeticus recurvus (Pheasant Eye) One of the last narcissus to flower and highly fragrant
- May October: Daphne x transatlantic Eternal Fragrance - compact, semi evergreen shrub.(I have them around the garden in different conditions are all are happy and actually have been flowering since April.)
- May December: Nemesia Denticulata
 'Confetti'. This is a perennial grown as an annual but Nick says 'its perennial, ignore label, grow in sheltered site and mulch!'

Flowers of the Night Zaluzianskya capensis 'Midnight Candy'

(Night Phlox) - scent of palma violets. Very long flowering. Pinch out early on to encourage branching and more flowers. **Mirabilis Jalapa** (4 o'clock plant) - grown from seed or more simply from tubers purchased in winter. Grows a metre in three weeks. It is frost tender so lift tubers or protect in winter.

Cestrum Nocturnum (Lady of the Night, Night Jasmine) This is a tender house or conservatory plant, powerfully fragrant from July through to September.

Brugmansia Suaveolens Frost tender shrub with tree like form, suitable for large pots. NOTE: ALL PARTS ARE POISONOUS

Roses

Almost impossible to simplify the complex scents of roses in just a few words, but here goes...

Old Rose Gallicas, Damasks and Albas - Full of warmth and depth. Gertrude Jeykll, Damask rose 'Ispahan' - the ideal sumptuous-looking (and smelling) rose. **Myrrh** English roses with strong scent

Myrrh English roses with strong scent of herbaceous green notes - R. Boscobel, The Generous Gardener

Tea Scent Tea and Noisettes, some english, for instance R. Graham Thomas. Warm violet notes.

Fruity Roses with chinensis parentage scented of apples, pears and guava. eg Lady Emma Hamilton (now retired) and enthusiastic climber Alberic Barbier.

Musk Scent produced from the stamen rather than petals, sweet, warm spice. eg Paul's Himalayan Musk or Rambling Rector.

Enjoy a superbly smelly year!

The Landscape Revolution

I love walking. I climb the Bury several times a week – taking in the views, spotting wildflowers and butterflies, relishing the passing contours.

But working as a rural affairs journalist for BBC Radio 4's Farming Today has given me a new perspective as I walk: where before I saw just beautiful views, now I see the fingerprints of shifting agricultural policy, written across the landscape.

An ancient hedgerow, now freshly cut and laid – there were Government grants for that. A stream with newly planted trees along the banks – maybe funded by the nattily named England Woodland Creation Offer. A field of multi-coloured flowers planted for pollinators or bird seed – perhaps paid for through the Sustainable Farming Incentive.

The more I have learnt about agricultural policy over the last 7 years, the more I have come to realise that it touches so many things – the lives and businesses of farmers for one, but also the food on our plates, the landscapes we see and the wildlife that lives there.

And right now, that policy is changing.

After Brexit, we left the EU's Common Agricultural Policy. For many people - whatever they made of Brexit - this was a golden opportunity to come up with something better. A new farming policy, which would encourage efficient food production while rewarding farmers for environmental work.

But the road to change has not been smooth. As policy has been written - and re-written - a live experiment has been playing out in the lives and fields of farmers across England.


telephone or email, and handling inward and outbound post.

Post Office: Euros are in stock, but remember to order your foreign currency on line or from the Post Office.




